## NEC CORNER:

**NEC CORNER** - The 2011 NEC will be adopted by the State of Georgia, January 1, 2012 without any statewide amendments.

### ARTICLE 250.6: OBJECTIONABLE CURRENT

Objectionable current occurs because of improper neutral-to-case connections or wiring errors that violate 250.142(b).

**PANELBOARDS:** Objectionable neutral current will flow when the neutral conductor is connected to the neutral case of a panelboard that is not used as service equipment.

### SEPARATELY DERIVED SYSTEMS

**(Transformers, Generators):** Objectionable neutral current will flow on conductive metal parts and conductors if the neutral conductor is connected to the circuit equipment grounding conductor on the load side of the system bonding jumper for a separately derived system.

**DISCONNECTS:** Objectionable neutral current will flow when the neutral conductor is connected to the metal case of a disconnecting means that is not part of the service equipment.

**WIRING ERRORS:** Objectionable neutral current will flow when the neutral conductor of one system is connected to a circuit of a different system.

**Dangers of objectionable current:** Current flow on metal parts can cause electric shock, fires and improper operation of electronic equipment and overcurrent devices.

- **Shock Hazard** – When objectionable neutral current flows on metal parts, electric shock even death can occur from elevated voltages on those parts.

- **Fire Hazard** – When objectionable current flows on metal parts, a fire can ignite adjacent combustible material, heat is generated whenever current flows particularly over high resistance connections. Arcing at loose connection is especially dangerous in areas containing easily ignitable and explosive gases, vapors or dust.
- **Improper Operation of Electronic Equipment** – Neutral current flow on metal parts can cause electromagnetic fields which negatively affect the performance of electronic devices, particularly medical equipment.
- **Operation of Overcurrent Devices** – When objectionable neutral current travels on metal parts tripping of electronic overcurrent devices equipped with ground-fault protection can occur because some neutral current flows on the circuit equipment grounding conductor instead of the neutral (grounded) conductor.

### MANPOWER:

### SAFETY:

Ladder Safety – We have had a significant number of ladder related accidents (6) lately. Most are attributed to improper use of a specific ladder. It is very important that the proper size and type ladder be used and all parts of contact firmly resting on solid footing.

Razor Knives: The number of lacerations has declined significantly since the no razor knife policy went into affect.
